# THE SPOTLIGHT SHINES ON JAMES (JIM) W. COLEMAN

To paraphrase Andy Warhol, "everyone will be famous for 15 minutes." On your next trip to the French Quarter in New Orleans, you can see for yourself the statue that provided Jim Coleman with his 15 minutes of fame. In 1952, a renowned sculptress, Ms. Angela Gregory, asked Jim to model for a Bienville (founder of New Orleans) monument, which would consist of a Frenchman (Bienville), an Indian and a monk. Jim was the model for the body of all three persons, but a "real" Frenchman posed for Bienville's face. Ms. Gregory received assistance from French dignitaries to develop her sculpture into a bronze statue. A picture of the statue is included on the next page.

The July 1983 issue of the Alabama Power Company magazine *Powergrams* includes an article about the Coleman family titled "the family that graduates together..." Within a few months of each other, Jim received a master's degree in business administration from the University of Alabama at Birmingham (UAB), his wife Rena and their daughter Rhonda each received a bachelor of science degree in nursing from Samford University, and their daughter Gale graduated from Berry High School. Of course, a few years later Gale graduated from Samford with a degree in nutrition. It should be noted that Jim had already received three other

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degrees dating back to 1955 in an effort to "quench his thirst for knowledge."





After graduating from Tulane University in 1955 with a business degree, Jim entered the Army and was stationed at Fort Bragg, North Carolina. The best thing that happened to him there was meeting Rena Ashworth, who became his wife in 1957. After his discharge from the Army, they moved to

Atlanta, Georgia, where Jim was employed by Texaco. During this employment, he attended the Atlanta Law School and obtained a law degree in 1961. His next employment was with Carolina Power and Light Company in Raleigh, North Carolina as a residential sales representative.

Jim joined Alabama Power Company in 1968 in the general office marketing department. The objective of his liaison with the residential, commercial and industrial market areas was to determine existing market penetrations of electrical loads and the market potential of each market. This information would allow management to develop programs to maximize the market potential to meet the needs of Alabama Power customers. Would you believe that during this time, Jim attended the Birmingham Law School at night and received a Juris Doctorate degree in 1972?

In 1990, Jim transferred to the Southern Company Services (SCS) energy services department in Atlanta, but maintained residence in Birmingham. He retired from SCS on July 1, 1993. Jim and Rena live in northern Shelby County and enjoy traveling, landscaping and growing blueberries, muscadines, scuppernongs, fruit trees and herbs. They also enjoy time spent with their five grandchildren, all of whom seem destined to earn one or more college degrees.

# THE SPOTLIGHT ALSO SHINES ON WAYNE P. WALTON

As is common for many SCS Retirees born during the 1930s depression, we were poor but did not let that keep us from setting goals that seemed unachievable, but then achieving them. Wayne Walton epitomizes this situation. He was born at the Tennessee Coal, Iron and Railroad Company in 1934 and lived in Ensley until his father lost his job at the coal company. For 16 months, Wayne and his family lived with his grandmother on a farm where they grew corn, oats, vegetables and some fruit. As World War II approached, steel mills began to operate and Wayne's father returned to work in

Fairfield. He worked hard to support the war effort and saved money to buy a house in Central Park. Wayne worked odd jobs to allow him to buy a motor scooter, a small motorcycle and finally a 1948 Chevrolet!

Wayne recalled two teachers who made a significant impression on him academically. Mrs. Culp taught geometry and observed that "brain work is the hardest work of all, which is why so many people do so little of it." Mrs. Bohemer taught chemistry in such a rigorous manner that students were well prepared for organic chemistry classes in college (Wayne made an A in these classes). However, he noted that he struggled at Alabama Polytechnic Institute both academically and financially. Support from his father and income from various jobs, including about \$1.00 a day while in advanced ROTC, enabled Wayne to graduate in mechanical engineering and to become a second lieutenant in the Army Signal Corps.

His two years of active duty were highlighted by the launch of Sputnik by the Soviet Union and the frenzied response by the United States. Wayne's job at the Army Pictorial Center on Long Island allowed him to develop and review the films of the Vanguard failures and successes before they were released to other government sources or the general public. Another task was to transfer World War II combat films to an acetate base for historical preservation.

In January 1959, Wayne returned to Birmingham and was employed by Southern Services, Incorporated to work with Jim Hire on Crist steam plant unit 5. After about two years, Wayne began to work with Howard Hubbard in Instruments and Control and remained in that area until retirement. Dramatic increases in air conditioning in the South led to significant amounts of design work related to the construction of new power plants. For many years, the annual rate of increase in electrical load was a straight line. However, when this trend began to flatten, utilities began to reduce work forces by early buy-outs. Wayne took advantage of the third buy-out to retire.

Wayne has always been interested in aviation, and he presented a program to us in January 2004 in

recognition of the 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Wright brothers' flight at Kitty Hawk, North Carolina. Wayne has visited several air shows and museums and can relate many interesting facts during a conversation. Try him! During retirement Wayne spends time with his wife, Jackie, and their grandchildren. He has participated in building and maintaining homes for the less fortunate, primarily through Habitat for Humanity and a Methodist Center in South Carolina. As you can see, his humble beginnings are now a major force in his activities.
