



This season the Festival chorus and orchestra is pleased to offer A German Requiem, Op. 45, by Johannes Brahms, which will be presented in English. Unlike the famous Mozart's Requiem, Brahms wrote his seven-movement Requiem not as an address to the dead but to comfort the living.

Over The Mountain Festivals is a community choral group that exists to foster and perpetuate the singing of sacred choral music and provide training and encouragement to directors of small choirs and choristers, both adults and children, to the glory of God, the edification of participants and the enjoyment of the greater Birmingham, Alabama community and beyond.

This year's chorus will consist of over 130 singers from across Alabama and the Memphis, TN area, including Cary Campbell, our SCS/SNC Retirees' website editor. The featured soloists will include Mrs. Sadie Goodman, Soprano, who has performed at Carnegie Hall in New York City and has been a chorister, cantor and soloist for daily masses broadcasted internationally on the Eternal Word Television Network, headquartered in Irondale, for over a decade. Mr. James A. Brown, Director of Music at Independent Presbyterian Church, Memphis, will conduct this beloved work. A pre-concert lecture discussing the history and significance of Brahms' Requiem will begin at 2:00 p.m., and there is no admission fee. Be Secure

Protecting yourself against phishing, scams, and identity theft is crucial in today's digital age. The victims of these fraudulent activities are predominantly retirees. Here are some effective strategies:

Phishing Protection

- Recognize the Signs: Be wary of emails or messages with urgent requests, or suspicious links.
- Don't Click on Unknown Links: Avoid clicking on links or downloading attachments from unknown sources.
- ↓ Verify the Source: Always verify the sender's email address and look for inconsistencies.
- Use Security Software: Install and update security software to detect and block phishing attempts.

Scam Prevention

- Be Skeptical: If something sounds too good to be true, it probably is. Be cautious of unsolicited offers and requests.
- **4** Educate Yourself: Stay informed about common scams and how they operate.
- Fraudulent Charge text/email: Do not respond by clicking a link or calling phone number appearing in an email or text message that has a fraudulent charge. Find appropriate phone number to call and check bank and credit card accounts.

Identity Theft Protection

- Secure Personal Information: Keep critical personal information, such as your Social Security number and bank details, in a safe place. Much of other information is publicly available and scammers use such information to contact you by email or text message.
- Monitor Accounts: Regularly check your bank and credit card statements for unauthorized transactions.
- Use Strong Passwords: Create strong, unique passwords for your accounts and change them regularly. Even though it takes time to get used to, password managers are highly effective in securing online accounts.
- Web Sites: Bookmark or add to favorites bank, brokerage, credit card and other important web sites and make it a habit to access these websites through bookmarks/favorites in your web browser. If possible download and use Apps to access online accounts.
- Enable Two-Factor Authentication: Add an extra layer of security to your accounts by enabling two-factor authentication.
- Shred Sensitive Documents: Shred documents containing personal information before disposing them.
- Use mobile payment service such as Apple Pay or Google Wallet instead of paying directly by credit or debit cards to minimize compromising physical cards. Be sure to turn NFC (near field communication) off on your phone in crowded locations.

Promote awareness among family and friends and stay vigilant and proactive in protecting your personal information. Be cautious and question anything out of the ordinary.

- February 17 President's Day and Washington's Birthday Presidents Day is also called Washington's Birthday as a celebration of the nation's first President.




