Holidays to Remember - May 2025



The origin of **Mother's Day** goes back to the era of ancient Greek and Romans. But the roots of Mother's Day history can also be traced in the UK where a Mothering Sunday was celebrated much before the festival saw the light of the day in US. However, the celebration of the festival as it is seen today is a recent phenomenon and not even a hundred years old.

We can thank the hard work of the pioneering women of their times - Julia Ward Howe and Anna Jarvis - that the day came into existence. Today the festival of Mother's Day is celebrated across forty-six countries (though on different dates) and is a hugely popular affair. Millions of people across the globe take the day as an opportunity to honor their mothers, thank them for their efforts in giving them life, raising them and being their constant support and well-wisher. Mother's Day 2024 will be celebrated on **Sunday, May 11**.



Memorial Day is an American holiday, observed on the last Monday of May, honoring the men and women who died while serving in the U.S. military. Memorial Day 2024 will occur on <u>Monday, May 26.</u> Originally known as Decoration Day, it originated in the years following the Civil War and became an official federal holiday in 1971. Many Americans observe Memorial Day by visiting cemeteries or memorials, holding family gatherings, and participating in parades. Unofficially, it marks the beginning of the summer season.

Since 1916, when President Woodrow Wilson issued a presidential proclamation establishing a national **Flag Day** on **Saturday**, **June 14**, Americans have commemorated the adoption of the Stars and Stripes in many ways–displaying the flag in the front of their homes, parades, and other patriotic observances. Prior to 1916, many localities and a few states had been celebrating the day for years. Congressional legislation designating that date as the national Flag Day was signed into law by President Harry Truman in 1949; the legislation also called upon the president to issue a flag day proclamation every year.



Father's Day is celebrated worldwide to recognize the contribution that fathers and father figures make to the lives of their children. This day celebrates fatherhood and male parenting. Although it is celebrated on a variety of dates worldwide, Father's Day is observed in the United States on the third Sunday in June. This year it will be observed on **Sunday, June 15**.

Stan is the Executive Vice President and Chief Operating Officer at Southern Company. He oversees Southern Company system electric operations to deliver on the promise of providing customers with the clean, safe, reliable and affordable energy that meets growing energy needs. He is responsible for how the system makes and moves electricity. This includes safety; system generation; transmission operations and policy;

technical and business shared services; commercial operations and Southern Wholesale Energy; system planning; research and development; environmental affairs and sustainability; and systemwi power delivery strategy. He leads the company's work to assess and deploy the full portfolio of elec generation technologies, including potential new nuclear development.

He served as chairman, president and CEO of Gulf Power from 2012 through 2018. In that role, he responsible for the integrated electric operations of the former Southern Company subsidiary servin nearly 450,000 customers across northwest Florida, including external and regulatory activities and company's financial results. Earlier in his career, he was responsible for fossil and hydroelectric generation at Georgia Power as its senior vice president and senior production officer. His earlier experience across the company ranges from customer operations, sales and marketing to power plant leadership. He has served across all Southern Company regulated electric subsidiaries in Alabama, Georgia and Mississippi.

He has served on the boards of a number of community and economic development organizations that support children and families and help communities grow. He was vice chair of Enterprise Florida, the state's public-private partnership for economic development, served on the Florida Chamber of Commerce board as chair of the policy council, and sat on the Florida Council of 100 board.

He served on the Electric Power Research Institute (EPRI) board of directors from 2017 to 2024, including as chairman. He is the lead independent director of Capital City Bank Group's board and serves on its audit committee. He serves on the Georgia Tech Advisory Board, which provides strategic vision and counsel for the institute's president and senior leadership.

He serves as the national response event coordinator for the Electricity Subsector Coordinating Council (ESCC). As the principal liaison between the federal government and the electric power industry, the ESCC coordinates efforts to safeguard America's critical energy infrastructure during major emergencies, including natural disasters and other threats.

Stan earned a bachelor's degree in mechanical engineering from the Georgia Institute of Technology. He has completed the Massachusetts Institute of Technology and National Academy for Nuclear Training's Reactor Technology Course for Utility Executives. He also has completed the Goizueta Executive Education Program at Emory University.

- Why is it that people say they "slept like a baby" when babies wake up cranky like every two hours?


